The Plan: Work through each section on your own first, looking up each Bible passage and making observations. Then meet with your group to discuss your observations. During your meeting, <u>do not</u> read every verse, which may stall momentum. Be sure to complete the "disciple making assignment" each week.

### The Plan for Each Week

We encourage you to walk through this series with two or three other people. When discipleship meetings are one on one, it usually creates a "Bible Answer Man" relationship. The one being discipled (Timothy) tends to look to the one who is leading (Paul) for all the answers. However, when you meet in a small group of three to five people, the focus can be turned to the Lord and Scripture. "We are meeting together to seek the Lord and learn from His Word."

#### The Role of Paul

A "Paul" initiates the discipleship process. The first phase is to form the group.

- 1. Pray for who should be part of the group. (all night) Luke 6:12-13
- 2. <u>Invite</u> each person to be part of the process. Matt 4:18-22
- 3. Clarify the <u>expectations</u> for each Timothy. For example: We will meet each \_\_\_\_\_\_\_ You are expected to have completed the section before we meet Each week, you will have a Disciple Making (DM) Assignment We will hold each other accountable for the DM Assignment We will consistently pray for one another, etc. etc.

When you meet, "Paul" <u>facilitates</u> the flow of your time together.

<u>Model</u> what Disciple Making (DM) looks like. The "Timothy's" in the group should be able to imitate you.

### Commitment & Accountability

This is not just another Bible study group.

This is focused training to follow Jesus and become a Fisher of Men.

Any Transfer of Knowledge must be followed by Obedience. Every skill in life is gained by knowledge and practice. Consider how we learn to ride a bike, drive a car, to cook, become a plumber, or doctor, or engineer.

There is classroom training and then there is some venue for doing – for practicing the skills under the watchful eye of the teacher. So it is with becoming a disciple maker, a fisher of men.

"Paul" is responsible for instilling some aspect of accountability into the group to ensure there exists opportunities for living out disciple making skills.

### Recommended Format of Each Meeting

Each time you gather together, we recommend you look three directions.



### Look Back

Encouragement, Celebration, Accountability, (about 20 minutes) Look back on what God has done, and is doing. Lovingly hold everyone accountable to report on their progress. Make course corrections, offer suggestions. Follow up on the "I WILL" statement and the Disciple Making assignment from the prior meeting.

Be sure to remember, this is spiritual work. Our role is to be faithful to speak the word. The results are in God's hands!

Look Up

New Insight from the Word of God, (about 60 minutes)

Look up and seek a better understanding of the Lord, and His will for our lives. Be careful to be filled with the Holy Spirit. Our ability to understand spiritual truth depends on the teaching ministry of the Spirit in our lives. The source document is the Bible. What is God saying to us through His Word?



### Look Forward

Response and Application, (about 20 minutes)

Look forward and address the next steps that need to be taken to incorporate God's truths, and instructions into your life. Write down a tangible step to be taken in response to God's word. It is often helpful to identify the next step in the form of an I WILL \_\_\_\_\_\_ statement. It should be specific and measurable.

1 Cor 15:1,3-4

Now I make known to you, brethren, the gospel which I preached to you, which you also received, in which also you stand,

by which also you are saved,

if you hold fast the word which I preached to you, unless you believed in vain.

For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins, according to the Scriptures, and

that He rose again the third day, according to the Scriptures,...



# "believe."

Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and you shall be saved... Acts 16:31

What does it mean to believe in Christ?

- 1) <u>Intellectual Agreement</u>: I understand and confess I am a sinner and that God is righteous. I understand Jesus bore the penalty of my sin, and that He rose from the dead as evidence of His divinity and victory. Because of His completed work on the cross on my behalf, He is offering to me the gift of eternal life.
- 2) <u>Personal Application</u>: This applies to me. I need to change my mind by confessing my sin and my need for a Savior who is Jesus Christ alone. The Bible calls this change of mind "*repentance*."

  I must choose to respond, to accept or reject the invitation of Christ.
- 3) <u>A Decision</u>: I consciously decide to entrust my eternal destiny to Christ and what He did for me on the cross. This decision is typically expressed by a prayer to God expressing faith in Christ and a need for God's salvation. The Bible refers to this decision as "calling on the name of the Lord."

For the Scripture says, "Whoever believes in Him will not be disappointed." For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek, for the same Lord is Lord of all, abounding in riches for all who call upon Him; for "Whoever will call upon the Name of the Lord will be saved."

Romans 10:11-13

To believe in Jesus means to entrust ourselves to Him alone for our salvation.

Faith alone, in Christ alone.

# The Spiritual Growth Process

Spiritual growth requires an intentional process that takes place over time. The typical believer will move through different phases of spiritual growth, similar to the physical growth we experience from infancy to adulthood.

#### Characteristics of Each Phase


**Infants** are totally dependent. They need constant care and nourishment.

**Children** are often selfish. They tend to focus on their own needs: "I want." They need training and life experiences in order to become mature.

**Young Adults** are learning to focus on others. They need encouragement, guidance, balance, and discernment.

**Spiritual Parents** are spiritually mature, equipped with the Word. They have a servant's heart and understand God's plan for making disciples. They need to initiate the discipleship process with those within their sphere of influence.

# Making Disciples of Others



Through spiritual growth, as we become more like Jesus, we become better equipped to make disciples of others.

# **Defining Some Key Terms**

**A Christian / Believer:** There is one condition to be saved: a definitive decision to *Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ*.

To the person who trusts in Christ, God gives the gift of eternal life. God has completed a once-for-all transaction of being born again. At a moment in time the person has been transferred from the kingdom of darkness into the kingdom of light. Col 1:13

**Disciple:** The word comes from the Greek word,  $\mu\alpha\theta\eta\tau\eta s$  (mathetes), which has the basic meaning of "learner, or pupil."

A disciple is a <u>learner</u> and a <u>follower</u> of Jesus Christ.

Today we might use the word apprentice or intern.

While believing is the crucial first step in following Jesus, the requirements of being a disciple are <u>continuous and daily</u>.

Unfortunately, many Christians fail to fully embrace their identity as disciples of Jesus Christ.

**Disciple Maker:** A Disciple Maker is a follower of Jesus who <u>comes along side</u> of another person and helps them find and follow Jesus. A Disciple Maker is intentionally looking to influence others toward Jesus, whether an unbeliever or a believer.

**Discipleship:** The <u>intentional process</u> where a Disciple Maker comes alongside another person to influence them toward Jesus – wherever they are on their journey. - The continual efforts to speak the word of God into a person's life, so that they take one step closer to Jesus. It is a lifelong endeavor.

The Bible tells us salvation is a gift of God that we receive by faith in Christ. To have faith in Christ is to trust in what Jesus accomplished by taking the penalty for our sins. There is nothing we can do to earn or deserve our salvation - it is a gift, that God offers by grace.

Just as there is nothing we contribute to obtain salvation, there is nothing we do to "keep" our salvation.

And the testimony is this, that God has given us eternal life, and this life is in His Son. He who has the Son has the life; he who does not have the Son of God does not have the life. 1 John 5:11-12

# God Completes an Irreversible Transaction

The moment we place our trust in Christ, the Bible describes a number of supernatural, instantaneous, permanent transactions that God completes to the benefit of the believer.

Truly, truly, I say to you, he who hears My word, and believes Him who sent Me, has eternal life, and does not come into judgment, but has passed out of death into life.

#### The Transaction of a New Standing, a New Identity "in Christ"

At the moment of salvation, the new believer is identified with, or placed "in Christ." This is accomplished by the Baptism of the Holy Spirit, 1 Cor 12:13. (We will look at that more in a later series.)

Our new position "in Christ" makes possible the pouring out of God's blessing on the believer. What blessings are described in the following verses?

### Three Wheels of Assurance

Assurance is not a 100% deal. Life does not work that way. When we are faced with severe trials, or persecuted for our faith, doubts can arise. Even John the Baptist experienced doubt when he was thrown into prison.

Matt 11:2-6

Describe the doubts of John the Baptist.

How did Jesus answer his doubts?

Assurance can be viewed as a tricycle with three wheels. There is one large wheel that is our main source of assurance. Then there are two smaller wheels that contribute to our assurance.



#### The Main Wheel of Assurance: The Promises of God

The bedrock of our assurance comes from **trusting** the promises of God. Jesus has offered the gift of salvation and promised that we receive eternal life through believing in Him.

We have just looked at over 20 passages that speak of the irreversible transaction of God that happens the moment we trust in Christ. These are promises of God. Our assurance comes from trusting God's Word.

This is one of the reasons the Word of God takes such an important role in our lives. We saw last week that the Bible is like spiritual food. It is the means through which we grow spiritually. The consistent intake of the Word of God builds our toolbox of promises from God. These promises strengthen our ability to **rest** in the assurance of our salvation.

Our **Relationship** with God is permanent!

Take another look at what Peter wrote:

- 1 Pet 1:3-5
- vs 3 What has God already done?
- vs 4 What has God promised every believer?
- vs 5 What makes the promise sure?

#### The Second Wheel of Assurance: Visible Changes in our Life

The Apostle John wants us to be assured of our salvation.

These things I have written to you who believe in the name of the Son of God, so that you may know that you have eternal life. 1 John 5:13

"These things" are the topics he covered throughout the book. As we grow spiritually and become more like Jesus, we can expect to see evidences in our lives. What evidences can we expect to see according to the following verses:

1 John 2:3

1 John 2:19

1 John 3:2-3

1 John 3:10; 1 John 2:9-10

1 John 3:13

1 John 5:13-15

Remember, our salvation does not depend on us. The above verses refer to evidences in our lives that should assure us that <u>God is changing us</u> to be more like Jesus.

### The Third Wheel of Assurance: The Holy Spirit

The third wheel of our assurance is the internal witness of the Holy Spirit. The moment we trust in Christ, believers are indwelled with the Holy Spirit. One of the ministries of the Holy Spirit is to give internal assurance that we belong to Christ. Write your observations:

Romans 8:14-17

1 John 4:13

Life can be hard, and we all experience times of doubt. But God wants us to maintain an assurance that we are saved; we belong to Him. This assurance comes through trusting His promises, seeing the evidence of Him working in our lives, and the internal witness of the Holy Spirit.

### The Eternal Plan of God

God is working out His eternal plan. It is so much bigger than us. However, He has also invited us to become part of His Plan. In Romans chapters 1-8, Paul lays out a comprehensive description of God's plan of salvation. At the end of chapter 8, he summarizes the Plan.

# **Section 3: Victory over Sin**

What happens when I sin?

What can I do about my sin?

Memorize 1 John 1:9

Last week we studied the transaction God completes in each person the moment we trust in Christ for salvation. The Bible describes this transaction as a one-time, instantaneous, irreversible event. From this we can conclude, the believer's **relationship** with God is **permanent**.

# Relationship vs. Fellowship

Consider the following example: A child is physically born into a family. This is a onetime irreversible event. There is nothing that can change the <u>relationship</u> that exists between the child and the parents.

However, now consider what happens when that child grows to become old enough to drive a car. Suppose a son asks his dad for permission to take the car for the evening. Ground rules have been established as to where the son can go with the car, and with whom. Now suppose the son disobeys, lies to his dad, and drives the car to an off limits party with a group of rowdy teens. Then the dad finds out what happened...

What has changed? The basic relationship between the father and the son still stands. The relationship is permanent.

However, the current experiential state of the relationship HAS changed. The Bible uses the word **fellowship**. The fellowship has been broken between the son and his father. The son lied and disobeyed; he knows it, and the father knows it. The father is disappointed with his son. In this state, the son stays clear of dad and tries to avoid speaking to him. Their fellowship is broken.

What needs to happen?

There is a process the father and son must go through to re-establish their fellowship, to regain a state in their relationship where they are on speaking terms and once again enjoy each other's company.

And so it is with our Heavenly Father...

# Fellowship with God

The character of God is multifaceted. However, there is one primary attribute that is often used to describe the overall nature of God. Notice the primary declaration made about God in the following:

Isaiah 6:1-7 vs 3 How is God described?

Rev 4:5-11 vs 8 How is God described?

In 1 John chapter 1, John uses the word picture of *light* to describe the holiness of God. With that as his starting premise, he explains that light and dark are mutually exclusive. Light and dark cannot co-exist together. This word picture is used to explain the spiritual principle that God cannot compromise His perfect character. When a believer sins, his fellowship with God is broken.

#### Walking in Light vs Walking in Darkness

John is writing to believers. He has, in very broad terms, described two ways a believer can walk, can live out their life. A believer can walk in light or walk in darkness. To walk in light is to walk in a manner consistent with the will of God, to obey the commands of God and to be quick to confess any know sins. To walk in darkness is to live out our lives in disobedience to God, to allow sin to dominate our lives.

John has also made a connection between our walk, and whether we are in **fellowship** with God. To walk in light results in being in fellowship with God. To walk in darkness breaks our fellowship with God. It must because God is light. Light cannot have fellowship with darkness.

John also acknowledges that as believers we continue to sin. In fact, to declare we do not sin is to deceive ourselves and call God a liar, vs 8, 10. Therefore, to walk in light does NOT mean we live sinless lives.

When the believer sins, God has provided a means for our fellowship with God to be restored. "If we confess..."

#### Confession

The word translated "confess" literally means "to say the same thing." To confess is to agree with God, to name our sins to God. According to verse 9, when we confess our sins to God, He promises to do two things. What are they:

God is faithful and righteous to do this because the Lord Jesus Christ has already paid the penalty for our sins on the cross. He now acts as an advocate before the Father. 1 John 2:1-2

# Temptation, Our Struggle with Sin

The passage in 1 John states two times (vs 8, 10) that we still have sin in our lives. To tempt someone means to lure or to bait them, to draw them in to do something that is wrong. The believer is constantly tempted to sin by the desires of his flesh and by the allurements of the world.

Temptations are so prevalent, that in His model prayer, Jesus included asking protection from temptations.

... And do not lead us into temptation, but deliver us from evil, Matt 6:13.

In later studies, we will examine in more detail the believer's internal struggle with sin and God's provisions for victory. Our starting point is to claim the promise of God regarding temptation:

# The Discipline of Spiritual Washing

As we are bombarded with temptations, we can expect there will be times when we fall to the temptation and choose to sin. According to 1 John 1, God is light, and He cannot have fellowship with darkness. When we sin, our fellowship with God is broken. However, God has given us the grace provision of **confession** to recover from sin.

If we confess our sins, He is faithful and righteous to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. 1 John 1:9

Notice, when we are careful to confess our known sins to God, He has promised to not only forgive those sins, but to cleanse us from **all** unrighteousness. This would include even unknown sins, sins we have done in ignorance.

The last phrase introduces the word picture of spiritual cleansing. Consider for a moment your normal routine of physical cleansing. For most of us, there are two reasons we wash up:

- 1) As part of a <u>normal routine</u>, for example, a shower every morning
- 2) Whenever we get dirty, after a workout or completing a dirty job

These practices, provide a great model for spiritual cleansing.

- 1) Take time at the beginning and/or end of each day for a time of reflection. Are there any sins in my life I have failed to confess? In a sense, take a spiritual shower as a matter of routine.
- 2) Any time you get dirty, as you go through the course of the day, whenever you sin (mental attitude sin, verbal sin, or an overt sin), stop and take a moment to confess that sin.

This is a great way to ensure you are walking in the light and remain in fellowship with God.



# Thinking Through Inspiration

If Scripture is not a matter of our own interpretation...
then we need to be careful to build accurate bridges



The Goal: To Conform our thoughts to God's Thoughts

Proper Bible interpretation requires that we build the correct bridges illustrated above. We need the proper context of:

Culture What was the cultural practice of the time?

History, and What is the historical context?

Geography Where did this happen?

# The Big Picture

The Bible was written by about 40 men, over a period of 1,500 years, (1400 BC to AD 90). The Old Testament was written mostly in Hebrew with some portions in Aramaic. The New Testament was written in Greek.

# Getting a Firm Grip on the Word of God

It is the intent of God that we understand the truths He has revealed in the Bible. Practically speaking, there are five disciplines that can help us get a firm grip on our understanding of the Bible. *The Navigators*, a mission organization that started on college campuses, have long used this illustration.



**Hear**Rom 10:17 Make it a priority to sit under the teaching of those who are gifted to teach the Word of God, and who stay close to the text of Scripture. Seek out a church where the Bible is taught.

**Read**Rev 1:3

Develop a habit of spending a few moments each day reading the Bible. There are many reading plans available that can guide your reading effort.

**Study**Some passages are difficult to understand. It takes diligent study to compare Scripture with Scripture to ensure you are getting a balanced view of any given topic.

**Memorize Ps 119:9-11** There is no better way to infuse the Word of God into our thinking than to memorize verses and promises that have special meaning to us.

**Meditate Josh 1:8-9** To meditate is to give active, diligent thought and consideration to the truths of Scripture. As we meditate on the Word, the Holy Spirit is able to "connect the dots" and help us to understand how it all ties together.

## **Section 6: The Local Church**

What happens at church?

Why is the church important?

Memorize Rom 12:10-13

The moment we trust in Christ, we are placed into the "*Body of Christ*." This is one of the names used in Scripture for the church. It is a simple yet profound word picture. We can visualize a physical body, made up of many parts, all connected and working together.

The church is God's provision for our spiritual growth, our encouragement, and our care. It is a training and support facility for the believer.

The word "church" comes from the Greek term ekklesia (Εκκλησια) and means an assembly of people, a gathering, called out ones.

The term is used to identify two views of the Church:

The **Universal Church** is made up of EVERY person who has placed their trust in Jesus Christ for salvation. We become members of the universal church at the very moment we place our trust in Christ as our Savior, through the baptizing work of the Holy Spirit. 1 Cor 12:13-14

A **Local Church** is the visible expression of the universal church in a specific location (1 Corinthians 1:2; Philippians 1:1; 1 Thessalonians 1:1). It is an assembly of believers who, under Christ and the delegated authority of its leadership, devote themselves to one another, and to God's Kingdom work within their sphere of influence. (Romans 12:10-13).

The local church is the main vehicle through which God carries out His purposes on earth. The local church can be thought of as a local "Embassy" where believers, as ambassadors of Christ, gather for worship, teaching, fellowship, prayer, and encouragement.

In the opening of Paul's letter to the church at Thessalonica, he commended them saying:

For the word of the Lord has sounded forth from you, not only in Macedonia and Achaia, but also in every place your faith toward God has gone forth, so that we have no need to say anything.

1 Thess 1:8

## The Functions Within the Local Church

The Local Church is a group of believers that God has brought together to represent Him within a specific location. The local church is a "support facility" for the believers to be prepared, trained, encouraged, and supported as they carry out their roles as ambassadors for Christ where they live. 2 Cor 5:16-21



## The Ordinances Practiced within the Church

The two ordinances practiced within the church are <u>water baptism</u> and <u>communion</u>, (also called the Lord's Table). We are careful to use the term "ordinance" because neither of these practices are a "sacrament." The word sacrament implies the imparting of some sort of divine blessing just by the act of participation. This teaching has no basis in Scripture, but has come out of church traditions.

#### Water Baptism

The word baptism comes from a Greek word "baptize," meaning to dip or immerse. A secular use of the word included to dip or immerse a cloth into a container of dye. The cloth comes out identified with the color of the dye. This led to a ceremonial use of the word, "to identify."

In the New Testament, the word is used in several contexts, but in each one, a person is identified with something. For example, Jesus Himself was baptized by John the Baptist. The baptism of Jesus obviously did not have anything to do with Jesus being saved. It was a public act of Jesus identifying Himself to be the Son of God, and the start of His public ministry according to the will of the Father.

Matt 3:13-17

Water baptism is an outward demonstration of the inward work of God in the life of the believer. It is a public testimony of a person's faith in Christ. In the book of Acts, it is seen as a <u>first step of obedience</u> for the new believer in following Jesus. Note the following:

Acts 2:41

#### **Communion**

Throughout Scripture God has implemented ways for His people to remember Him and what He has done. Note some of the OT examples:

Ex 12:14

Deut 5:12-15

Num 15:37-41

The night Jesus was arrested, He observed the Passover meal with His disciples. He took two elements from the Passover feast, and instituted a new ordinance for believers to observe, until He returns:

Luke 22:14-23

We are to observe this *in remembrance* of Him. The bread is a reminder of the body of Christ, the person of Christ. Jesus Christ is both God and man, and without sin. Only Jesus was qualified to be our sacrifice for sin – to die in our place. The cup is a reminder of the blood that Jesus shed for us on the cross. On the cross Jesus bore the penalty of our sin, spiritual death. Together, the bread and the cup are a reminder of the <u>Person</u> and <u>Work</u> of Jesus on our behalf.

In his instructions to the believers in Corinth, Paul included a warning as to the seriousness of approaching the Lord's table in a worthy manner.

1 Cor 1:23-32

As we observe the Lord's Table, we are reminded of the enormity of the love that Jesus demonstrated for us in removing the eternal penalty of our sin. He first loved us. It is His love that should compel us to love in return, through a life that is pleasing to Him.

2 Cor 5:14-15

# Church Family Relationships

In describing a "worthy walk" of every believer, Paul starts with talking about our relationships within the local church. What does Paul say about unity?

Life is all about relationships. Relationships take time and effort. Relationships are built through communication and shared experiences. But we live in a fast-paced culture, filled with activity. This means that for us to build and foster these *one another* relationships, it will take intentional effort.

Phil 2:3-4

Investing in relationships takes time and effort, but these relationships become the greatest source of blessing in our lives.

## Not a Building, or an Event

The local church is not a building. The local church is not an event one attends once a week. The local church is <u>a family</u> of believers, united in Christ, who care, support, and encourage one another.

# Who Does the Ministry?

Many churches come from a tradition that includes a separate group of people who are specifically tasked to do the work of the church (clergy, pastors, priests etc.). This traditional view comes from the Old Testament and from the history of church denominations. In the OT, the tribe of Levi was designated by God to function as priests, to represent God before men and to offer sacrifices to God on behalf of men. The clergy/laity distinction has made its way into most denominations. While there is a valid role of spiritual leadership within the church, the traditional clergy/laity distinction is not what the Bible teaches.

The body of Christ is made up of many members, each fulfilling a unique role. Every believer contributes to the work of "ministry." Notice what Paul says regarding the role of the pastor and teacher.

Eph 4:11-16

# Going Deeper, Church Leadership

Jesus Christ has delegated spiritual authority to elders to act as under-shepherds of His flock. What instructions are given to the pastor/elders?

The qualifications for elders are set forth in 1 Tim 3:1-7, and Titus 1:5-9.

#### **Deacons**

The origin of deacons goes back to <u>Acts 6:1-7</u>. In the early church, there was a group of Hellenistic Jewish widows who were being overlooked. The apostles instructed the church to select 7 men to ensure their needs were being met. From this account comes the basic role and responsibility of the deacons:

To meet the physical needs of the members of the body, such that the spiritual leaders can remain focused on spiritual oversight, namely prayer and the ministry of the Word of God.

The qualifications for deacon candidates are outlined in 1 Tim 3:8-13.



# **Section 7: Sharing My Faith**

The basic invitation

How do I tell others?

Memorize 1 Pet 3:15

The welcome letter at the beginning of this booklet reminds us that believers are intended by God to be disciples who are "fishers of men."

Every section of this booklet contributes to the learning process of following Jesus, but the goal is to personally become a fisher of men. What can we learn from the word picture of "catching men"?

Matt 4:19

Note this verse has a condition, and describes a transformation that Jesus will do that results in us becoming something new. The Bible uses additional expressions to describe our role of fishing for men.

#### Sent Ones, Just Like Jesus

This all starts with Jesus. Why did Jesus come to earth?

Lk 19:10

On the evening before Jesus was to be crucified, John records His prayer to the Father. Jesus prayed for those who would *believe in Me through their word*. That is Us! What does Jesus say about us in this prayer?

John 17:18-21

John 20:21

Consider this privilege. Jesus has invited us to continue the work that He has started. There is no greater and fulfilling "job opportunity!"

As the Father has sent the Son, so Jesus has sent us.

# Disciples Who Make Disciples

The primary term Jesus used was **disciple**. A disciple is a learner and a follower. The term we would use today is an apprentice. For example if someone wants to become a plumber, they find a licensed plumber (a master) to work alongside to learn the trade. A disciple is anyone who follows Jesus to learn from Him how to walk in a manner that pleases God.

However, the call to become a disciple of Jesus includes high standards. What do the following verses say about being a disciple of Jesus?

Matt 16:24-26

Lk 9:57-62

Lk 14:25-35

John 8:31-32

The goal of the following and learning is to become better equipped to carry on the work of Jesus. Jesus summarized the task in what is called the Great Commission.

Matt 28:18-20

- vs 18 What does Jesus remind the disciples?
- vs 19 The main verb is "make disciples."

What is the extent of the task?

vs 19-20 Making disciples includes two primary functions:

- 1) \_\_\_\_\_ them (everything leading up to salvation)
- 2) \_\_\_\_\_ them how to live, all I commanded you

Every believer is called to follow Jesus, to become trained and able to make disciples of others.

#### **Witnesses**

After the resurrection, Jesus spent 40 days with the disciples preparing them for what lay ahead. He was returning to heaven. The work He started of seeking the lost was now passed to His disciples. Acts 1:1-3

Jesus instructs them to remain in Jerusalem to wait for the promise of the Holy Spirit whom Jesus would send. Jesus introduces a new term to describe their work.

Acts 1:8 You shall be My \_\_\_\_\_\_
What is the scope of the task?
What must be true of a witness, for the witness to be effective?
What must a witness do to be a witness?

# **Ambassador Preparation**

The ambassador must be able and ready to clearly present the invitation from the King.

But even if you should suffer for the sake of righteousness, you are blessed And do not fear their intimidation, and do not be troubled, but sanctify Christ as Lord in your hearts, always being ready to make a defense to everyone who asks you to give an account for the hope that is in you, yet with gentleness and reverence; and keep a good conscience so that in the thing in which you are slandered, those who revile your good behavior in Christ will be put to shame.

1 Peter 3:14-16

# **Telling Your Story**

The Samaritan woman did not have any training, but she had a story. She immediately went out and told people she knew, what Jesus had done in her life.

If you have trusted in Christ, you have a story to tell. It may not be a story that will make it into a best selling book, but it is your story. It is unique to you. It is real, and no one can deny your story. There is no theological debate.

He then answered, "Whether He is a sinner, I do not know; one thing I do know, that though I was blind, now I see."

John 9:25

# Nuggets for a Spiritual Conversation

Beginning a conversation about Jesus can be very intimidating. How can I turn a conversation to spiritual things? Consider the following two key points:

- 1) Earning the right
- 2) Asking good questions

#### **Earning the Right**

You have earned the right to talk to this person (depending on the context).

To a neighbor, you have shown kindness.

To a work mate, you have been eager to help them.

To a fellow passenger on a plane, you have been friendly.

#### **Asking Good Questions**

Ask questions to show genuine interest in them as a person.

Explore if there is any spiritual interest or background.

Ask if they have any knowledge of church or Jesus.

Ask if they have a religious background, ask about their experience.

Learn about their perspective of God and what God requires.

Ask if they have any first-hand experience of what the Bible teaches.

Ask if you can tell your story of how you came to know God through Jesus.

See the sample questions in the Appendix.

## The Irreversible Work of God

The moment we place our trust in the work of Jesus Christ for our salvation, there are a number of supernatural, <u>permanent</u> transactions that God performs to the benefit of the believer:

## New Life: Made Spiritually Alive

The natural man is spiritually dead, separated from God, unable to understand spiritual things. At the moment of salvation, the believer is spiritually born, made alive:

From death to life John 5:24; Col 2:13-15

Born Again into God's family John 1:12; 3:7; Gal 3:26; 1 Pet 1:23

Regenerated by the Holy Spirit Titus 3:5

New Creation 2 Cor 5:17; Eph 4:24; 2 Pet 1:3-4

Reconciled 2 Cor 5:18-19

#### New Home: Transferred Citizenship

The natural man is within the domain of Satan's kingdom. At salvation, the believer is transferred into God's kingdom.

Transferred into God's Kingdom Col 1:13 (rescued us)
Heavenly Citizens Phil 3:20

## New Standing: Legally Declared Righteous

The relative righteousness of man does not meet the absolute, perfect standard of God's righteousness. At salvation, the believer is credited with the righteousness of Christ and declared justified by God the Father.

Credited with +R of Christ 2 Cor 5:21; Phil 3:8-9

Declared Justified Rom 5:1; Rom 3:26-28; Gal 2:16

No condemnation Rom 8:1, 31-34 Cannot be separated from God Rom 8:35-39

## New Identity: Placed "In Christ"

At salvation, the believer is identified with or placed in Christ. This makes possible the pouring out of God's blessing.

In the Body of Christ 1 Cor 12:13

Adopted as adult sons Rom 8:15; Gal 4:4-7 Inheritance of Christ 1 Pet 1:3-4; Eph 1:11

Complete In Him Col 2:10

# The Three Aspects of our Relationship with God

Every relationship in life has three aspects:

1. The <u>Basis</u> of the Relationship, Why the relationship exists, in most cases there is a defining event that established the relationship, (birth, wedding, hired for a job, moved into a neighborhood).

Our Relationship with God: The believer's Standing <u>in Christ</u> because of the work of God at the moment we trusted in Christ. We were *born again*. The one time, irreversible transaction described on the previous page. John 5:24;1 Cor 1:30; Eph 2:1-9

2. The Experiential <u>State</u> of the Relationship at a given time, Describes how the relationship is doing at the current time. Vibrant, close, OR cold, in conflict, not on speaking terms Our Relationship with God: Typically expressed in the "Walk" passages. The believer is either Walking in the Light, in Fellowship with God, OR Walking in Darkness, out of Fellowship with God. Conditioned on obedience, and being cleansed through confession. Jesus used the word "abide" in John 15.

Walk Passages: 1 John 1 Gal 5 Eph 4 Col 1:10; 3;

Phil 3:17

2 Cor 5:7

3. The <u>Maturity Level</u> of the Relationship, Describes the nature of the relationship as it has gradually grown over time.

Our Relationship with God: As we grow spiritually, our relationship grows, God relates to us as a child, or as a teen, or as a young adult, or as an adult. Eph 4:11-16; Heb 5:11-14

In 1 Corinthians, Paul is writing to a church that is filled with divisions. In chapter 3, he addresses all three aspects of their relationship with the Lord:

vs 1 I have to speak to you as infants, (their Maturity level)

in Christ, (the Basis of their relationship)

- vs 2 I gave you milk to drink, (because they are spiritual infants)
- vs 3 for you are still fleshly, ...

and walking like mere men, (Experiential state of their relationship)

- 2) How can all religions be right and so different?
- 3) How is it possible for a person to know what is right?
- 4) What is the source of your moral authority?

#### Right & Wrong:

- 1) Do you think there are absolutes when it comes to right and wrong?
- 2) How do you teach your kids right from wrong?
- 3) Why do you think our culture has moved away from absolutes of R & W?
- 4) Why do people try to live Good Lives?

#### **Knowing God:**

## (Getting to know your view of God)

- 1) Why are there so many misconceptions about God?

#### Section 4 Notes on the Bible

Evidences for Divine Inspiration of the Bible, by Dennis Rokser

#### 1. SUPERNATURAL UNITY

The Bible consists of 66 books (39 in the Old Testament and 27 in the New Testament) written over 1600 years by about 40 different authors from all walks of life, yet without contradiction or error. If you had a room filled with 40 people with notebooks, and you asked them to write down their thoughts about God, Satan, sin, origins, prophecy, life, death, heaven, hell, etc. • would they all agree? Never! Unless God the Holy Spirit was directing each of them. This is the very reality the Bible evidences.

All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness. (2 Timothy 3:16)

Knowing this first, that **no prophecy of the scripture** is of any private interpretation. For the prophecy came not in old time by the will of man: but **holy men of God spake** as they were moved by the Holy Ghost. (2 Peter 1:20-21)

#### 2. FULFILLED PROPHECY

Unlike the other holy books of various religions, the Bible includes amazing and numerous prophecies that have been specifically fulfilled. In Christ's first coming, over 100 Old Testament predictions about the Messiah were specifically fulfilled. The mathematical odds of this occurring are astronomical. Your chances of winning a 175

million dollar Power-Ball lotto are 10 times better than these predictions being fulfilled by one person • yet it did with Jesus Christ.

A sampling of these are...

- Christ's birth (Isaiah 7:14 Matthew 1:18)
- Christ's birthplace (Micah 5:2 Matthew 2:1)
- Christ's death by crucifixion (Psalm 22:16 Matthew 27:38)
- Christ's betrayal (Zechariah 11:12 Matthew 26:15)
- Christ's substitionary death and resurrection (Isaiah 53 Matthew 27 & 28)

#### 3. AMAZING UNIQUENESS

Being inspired by God, the Bible is unique in its claims, teaching, and preservation. Unlike the Koran, Book of Mormon, Upanishads, etc., the Bible claims over 5,000 times to be the Word of God. It also teaches that one's eternal salvation from divine retribution and reception of eternal life is by grace alone through faith alone in Christ alone apart from religious works or rituals. Regarding its unique preservation, Voltaire, the French philosopher of the eighteenth century announced, "One hundred years from my day, there will not be a Bible in the earth except one that is looked upon by an antiquarian curiosity - seeker." Ironically, one hundred years later, Voltaire was dead and his own house and press were being used to print and store Bibles by the Geneva Bible Society. Doesn't God have a sense of humor?

Heaven and earth shall pass away, but my words shall not pass away. (Matt 24:35)

For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast. (Eph 2:8,9)

#### 4. ARCHAEOLOGY

Though modern archaeology grew out of a desire to support evolution, the archaeologist's spade has been a friend and not a foe to the Bible. Middle Eastern archaeological digs repeatedly have uncovered artifacts that render support to the accuracy and historicity of the Bible.

- Discovery of the Nuzi Tablets (1925) confirmed numerous Old Testament customs and practices.
- Discovery of the Dead Sea Scrolls (1947) confirmed the accuracy of the Hebrew text of Scripture.
- Discovery of the Ebla Tablets (1975) confirmed various biblical events and names.
- Discovery of a silver amulet in Jerusalem with the name "YAHWEH" on it (1980)
  first time the tetragrammaton has been found in an archaeological excavation.

#### **5. TESTIMONY OF JESUS CHRIST**

Jesus Christ repeatedly gave confirmation and testimony to the divine origin and reliability of the Scriptures. He believed the Bible to be the divinely inspired Word of God. Jesus Christ said,

- If he called them gods, unto whom the word of God came, and the scripture cannot be broken. (John 10:35)
- For verily I say unto you, Till heaven and earth pass, one jot or one tittle shall in no wise pass from the law, till all be fulfilled. (Matthew 5:18)
- But he answered and said unto them, Why do ye also transgress **the commandment of God** by your tradition? For **God commanded**, saying, Honour thy father and mother: and, He that curseth father or mother, let him die the death. (Matthew 15:3-4)

Jesus Christ also believed and confirmed many of the accounts of the Old Testament, such as...


- the destruction of Sodom & Gomorrah (Luke 17:29)
- the death of Lot's wife (Luke 17:32)
- the murder of Abel by Cain (Luke 11:51)
- the calling of Moses (Mark 12:26)
- the universal flood of Noah's day (Matthew 24:37)
- the great fish and Jonah (Matthew 12:39-41)
- the creation of Adam and Eve (Matthew 19:4-5)


## The Ambassador Toolbox

This booklet is part of a series of materials which together give us a toolbox of resources we can use to make disciples. Every discipleship opportunity is different. There is no one cookie-cutter approach. However, the following resources are designed to give you a place to start.

- *3 Circles: Life Conversation Guide*, a pamphlet outlining a diagram of circles to initiate a spiritual conversation that sets the context for the gospel.

- **New Life in Christ** This 5 week booklet is for the new believer. I just trusted in Christ, what happens now?
- Making Disciples, Series 1, Essentials for the New Believer, an 8 week study that covers the essentials for living a Christ centered life. Don't let the name fool you, it covers good reminders for any believer, no matter how long you have been saved.
- Making Disciples, Series 2, Foundations of the Faith, an 8 week study that covers the doctrines of God, man, sin, and salvation. A solid understanding of these foundational topics provide stability and confidence to the believer.
- Making Disciples, Series 3, Pressing on to Maturity, an 9 week study that covers the supernatural provisions of God for the believer to walk in a manner that honors Christ.
