Introduction

Discipleship is one of the most common words used in churches, yet many of us have not found a way to make it real in our lives. This booklet is a training guide on how to lead a small group Bible study. In keeping with our goal to make disciples who make disciples, this Bible study approach is intended to be **transferable** and **repeatable**. It is not overwhelming. This does not require specialized training or tools. It is intended to support your life long journey of helping other people find and follow Jesus Christ.

This approach is called the **Discovery** Bible Study Method. It is especially effective in drawing seekers or new believers into a personal encounter with God through His Word. The example studies in this booklet lead a group through a study of the Life of Christ.

General Goals

For You: To equip you to lead a Discovery Bible Study of the Life of Christ.

For Others: This gives you a tool to help build up <u>others</u> in their understanding of Jesus.

Just Do It

Skill comes with practice. Books and books are available on how to lead a Bible study, but the best way to learn is to just do it. In your efforts to influence others, be sure to maintain your close relationship with Jesus by spending time each day in personal Bible reading, study and prayer.



What does it mean to believe in Christ?

- 1) <u>Intellectual Agreement</u>: I understand and agree I am a sinner, and that God is righteous. I understand that Jesus bore the penalty of my sin. He rose from the dead as historical proof He is who He claimed to be. Because of His completed work on the cross on my behalf, He is offering to me the gift of eternal life.
- 2) <u>Personal Application</u>: This applies to me. I need to change my mind regarding my sin, my need for a Savior, and the person and work of Jesus Christ. The Bible calls this change of mind "repentance." I must choose to respond, to accept or reject the invitation of Christ.
- 3) <u>A Decision</u>: I choose, by a conscious, point-in-time decision, to entrust my eternal destiny to Christ and what He did for me on the cross. This decision is expressed by a salvation prayer to God. The Bible refers to this decision as "calling on the name of the Lord."

For the Scripture says, "Whoever believes in Him will not be disappointed." For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek, for the same Lord is Lord of all, abounding in riches for all who call upon Him; for "Whoever will call upon the Name of the Lord will be saved."

Romans 10:11-13

To believe in Jesus, means to entrust ourselves to Him alone for our salvation.

The Spiritual Growth Process

Spiritual growth requires an intentional process that takes place over time. The typical believer will move through different phases of spiritual growth, similar to the physical growth we experience from infancy to adulthood.

Characteristics of Each Phase


Infants are totally dependent. They need constant care and nourishment.

Children are selfish, "I want." They need training and life experiences.

Young Adults are learning to focus on others. They need encouragement, guidance, balance, and discernment.

Spiritual Parents are spiritually mature, equipped with the Word. They have a servant's heart and understand God's plan for making disciples. They need to initiate the discipleship process with those within their sphere of influence.

Making Disciples of Others



Through spiritual growth, as we become more like Jesus, we become better equipped to make disciples of others.

The Means of Spiritual Growth

Scripture uses the word picture of spiritual growth. When a baby is born, he begins a lifelong process of maturity to become prepared to fulfill his role in life.

Section I: The Discovery Bible Study Method

What is DBS?

How can I use DBS to lead a small group?

DBS is a method of small group Bible Study that any group can use. The core characteristic is to direct people to the text of God's Word, and only the text. The group is led by a **facilitator** who guides the group, but does NOT teach the group.

So will My word be which goes forth from My mouth; It will not return to Me empty, without accomplishing what I desire, and without succeeding in the matter for which I sent it. Is 55:11

"We are all here to learn from what God says in the Bible."

DBS is especially effective in directing a group of people to the text of Scripture. God speaks to us through His Word.

The Distinctive Value of DBS

DBS is Reproducible! Anyone who has been part of DBS, who understands the DBS process, can go out and start another DBS small group.

A typical small group is led by a "teacher." This person becomes the "Bible answer man." Others in the group conclude, "I could never do that." There is certainly a place for teaching, but it is not easily reproducible. To become a qualified teacher requires adequate training.

A DBS group is not led by a Teacher. DBS is led by a facilitator who does not answer questions. This point is critical to instilling the DNA of reproduction. The facilitator does not teach, but must ensure the group follows the DBS process.

The DBS Process

Read, Discover, Obey, and Share, that is the discovery process.

We read God's Word out load.

Next we put God's Word into our own words. We "retell" the passage to make sure we really understand what the passage says.

Then we discover the main truths about God and man.

After a discussion of the passage, we commit to two things:

We commit to change our life so that we <u>obey</u> God's Word We commit to share God's word with at least one other person.

In our culture, the Christian life has become "knowledge based." We study and read the Bible, we listen to excellent Bible teaching, and we learn a lot about what the Bible says. We are even able to debate various theological issues.

God does not intend for us to only "know" His Word, but to "Obey" His Word. Consider the instruction of James:

James 1:22-25

Basic Flow of a DBS Small Group

Reconnect & Pray

What is one thing you are thankful for today? What is a challenge you are facing?

Prayer can be as simple as telling God the things we are thankful for and talking with Him about the things we are worried or stressed about.

Can someone retell the story from last time, and tell what we learned from it? What did you learn from your personal study time this last week? What is God teaching you this week? How did you do on your "I will" and sharing from last week?

Read the Scripture

Have someone read the passage, while everyone else follows along in their Bible. (You may want to provide a copy of the passage, so everyone is literally on the same page. This reduces confusion from multiple translations.) Have a second person read the passage. This time have everyone else just listen to the reading.

Retell

Ask for a volunteer to retell the passage in their own words, preferably without looking at the passage. When they are done, ask the group to fill in any points that may have been left out. If time permits, have a second person retell the passage. Do not underestimate the value of retelling. This exercise will give a person the ability to share with someone else what they learned from the Bible.

Discuss & Discover

As a group, discuss the passage. The following sample questions are helpful: Did anything in this passage capture your attention?

What do we learn about God in this passage? (Jesus)

What do we learn about ourselves/people in this passage?

Are there any specific commands to obey?

any specific temptations to avoid?

any specific <u>promises</u> to claim?

any specific <u>examples</u> to follow?

Discussion Guidelines: (The primary job of the facilitator)

All observations, and comments <u>must come directly from THIS passage</u>. No other verses, no outside opinions one has heard from some teacher.

It is always valid for anyone to ask:

"Where do we see that in these verses?"

This is the primary protection from the group wandering into false teaching. No one is permitted to insert their opinions into the discussion. All comments must come directly from observing what the text says.

All observations must come from only this text.

If a question is asked, the facilitator is not to answer the question. Once you allow for that dynamic, the facilitator becomes the "Bible answer man." Remember a key goal is to make this process <u>repeatable</u>. We want every person to conclude, "I can go do this. I could lead a DBS group."

When a question is asked, if the answer is not in the text, redirect the focus back to God teaching us from His Word. Respond with something like: "I think as we study more, we will find the answer."

Commit to Obey

Knowledge of God's Word must translate into obedience. It is the intent of God for us to live out His truth.

The secret things belong to the Lord our God, but the things revealed belong to us and to our sons forever, that we may observe all the words of this law. Deut 29:29

If anyone is a hearer of the word and not a doer, he is like a man who looks at his natural face in a mirror; for once he has looked at himself and gone away, he has immediately forgotten what kind of person he was. But one who looks intently at the perfect law, the law of liberty, and abides by it, not having become a forgetful hearer but an effectual doer, this man will be blessed in what he does. James 1:23-25

How can you use what you learned today to begin a spiritual conversation? Encourage everyone to identify a person who needs to hear what God says. Is there a person in need the group is able to help?

About the DBS Process

Reconnect & Pray:

Help the group "look back" and <u>build relationships</u> by expressing gratitude and sharing needs.

Review:

This helps maintain continuity of the study. The Bible is connected, not stand alone stories. Also this begins to build an environment of <u>accountability</u> to encourage everyone to follow through and live out the insights from last week's study.

Read & Retell:

Helps the group focus and "get it." As we hear someone "retell" it challenges everyone to ask, "Can I retell this passage?"

Discuss & Discovery:

This is the core of DBS. The insights from each person, contribute to the insights gained by the entire group. There must always be a freedom to ask, "Where did you see that in these verses?" to keep the group self-correcting and on track with Scripture.

Commit to Obey:

This is the centerpiece. This is where we choose to act on what we learn about God and man. The "I will" statements do not need to be profound, but rather, concise and measurable. The "I will" statements can become life changing!

Commit to Share:

This is the reminder of our role as Ambassadors. We are called to make disciples who make disciples. The commitment to share sets the directional focus of the group. It is not just about me, it is also about the people in my life who need Jesus.

Going Deeper with DBS

The Facilitator Role

You are <u>not to function as a Teacher</u>, but as a Facilitator.

Ensure everyone in the group is <u>welcomed</u>, and free to contribute.

Keep the discussion <u>moving</u>, and focused on the passage. Do not allow the group to get "wrapped around the axle" on some theological issue.

Keep track of the <u>time</u>, and respect everyone's time.

This is not a personal therapy session. Do not let any one person dominate the discussion or the group.

Guard the integrity of the DBS process. Stick to the text.

Keep it light, allow the group to have <u>fun</u>.

Practice DBS

Gather with 2 or 3 other people and ask them to practice DBS with you. Here are three passages you can use:

⁴Now John himself had ¹¹a garment of camel's hair and a leather belt around his waist; and his food was locusts and wild honey. ⁵Then Jerusalem was going out to him, and all Judea and all the district around the Jordan; ⁶and they were being baptized by him in the Jordan River, as they confessed their sins.

⁷But when he saw many of the Pharisees and Sadducees coming for baptism, he said to them, "You brood of vipers, who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? ⁸Therefore bear fruit in keeping with repentance; ⁹ and do not suppose that you can say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham for our father'; for I say to you that from these stones God is able to raise up children to Abraham. ¹⁰The axe is already laid at the root of the trees; therefore every tree that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire.

Then he *permitted Him. ¹⁶After being baptized, Jesus came up immediately from the water; and behold, the heavens were opened, and whe saw the Spirit of God descending as a dove *and* lighting on Him, ¹⁷and behold, a voice out of the heavens said, "This is My beloved Son, in whom I am well-pleased."

The event in John 5 is in Jerusalem during the 2^{nd} Passover, marking the beginning of the second year of His earthly ministry. (1^{st} is John 2:13)

John 5:1-24

After these things there was a feast of the Jews, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. ²Now there is in Jerusalem by the sheep *gate* a pool, which is called in ¹⁶Hebrew ¹⁶Bethesda, having five porticoes. ³In these lay a multitude of those who were sick, blind, lame, and withered, [¹⁶waiting for the moving of the waters; ⁴for an angel of the Lord went down at certain seasons into the pool and stirred up the water; whoever then first, after the stirring up of the water, stepped in was made well from whatever disease with which he was afflicted.] ⁵A man was there who had been ¹⁶ill for thirty-eight years. ⁶When Jesus saw him lying *there*, and knew that he had already been a long time *in that condition*, He *said to him, "Do you wish to get well?" ⁷The sick man answered Him, "Sir, I have no man to put me into the pool when the water is stirred up, but while I am coming, another steps down before me." ⁸Jesus *said to him, "Get up, pick up your pallet and walk." ⁹Immediately the man became well, and picked up his pallet and *began* to walk.

Now it was the Sabbath on that day. ¹ºSo the Jews were saying to the man who was cured, "It is the Sabbath, and it is not permissible for you to carry your pallet." ¹¹But he answered them, "He who made me well was the one who said to me, 'Pick up your pallet and walk.'" ¹²They asked him, "Who is the man who said to you, 'Pick up your pallet and walk'?" ¹³But the man who was healed did not know who it was, for Jesus had slipped away while there was a crowd in that place. ¹⁴Afterward Jesus *found him in the temple and said to him, "Behold, you have become well; do not sin anymore, so that nothing worse happens to you." ¹⁵The man went away, and told the Jews that it was Jesus who had made him well. ¹⁶For this reason the Jews were persecuting Jesus, because He was doing these things on the Sabbath. ¹⁷But He answered them, "My Father is working until now, and I Myself am working."

The Inductive Bible Study method seeks to ensure we "pull out the facts" as to what the Bible really says. It helps to limit the influence of our biases, and to be objective and allow us to learn what the Scripture teaches. These guidelines help us in our study of the Bible.

1. Pray

2. Make Observations - The Entire Book

Get an overview of the book:

<u>Author's Purpose for writing</u>

Begin an Outline of the Entire Book, or a Structure Chart with Section titles
The goal here is to understand the <u>Structure</u> or flow of the book

Conduct Word Study on major words
Identify verbs; tense, voice, and mood
Cross Reference other Scripture
Check the Commentaries, (*Do this last*)
Summarize - Restate the verse in your own words

4. Accurate Interpretation, Illumination, John 16:12-15

What does the passage mean? Summarize your study. Re-state the passage in your own words. Ensure that we have built an accurate bridge.

Principles of Interpretation:

- 1. *Context Rules*. The interpretation must be consistent with the flow and purpose of the book. Ex: Heb 6:4-6 What is the context?
- 2. Always seek the Full Counsel of God. We must consider all that the Bible has to say on a given topic. Prayer: John 15:7 but what about, 1 John 5:14-; James 4:3 etc.
- 3. *Scripture will never contradict Scripture*. The Bible is a perfect expression of God's truth to mankind.

Ex: Rom 3:27-28; 4:1-3 vs James 2:17, 21ff

Therefore: *The Bible is the best commentary of the Bible. Compare Scripture with Scripture.*

Acts 2:38 "for" in order to get, or because of

Acts 10:34, 47 baptized after salvation

4. Interpret the Scripture Literally.

"When the plain sense of Scripture makes common sense, seek no other sense, therefore, take every word at its primary, ordinary, usual, literal meaning unless the facts of the immediate context, studied in the light of related passages and axiomatic and fundamental truths, indicate clearly otherwise."

- 5. Do not base your doctrine on obscure passages of Scripture. There are some passages that are hard to understand. We are warned about those who would distort such passages. 1 Peter 3:15-16. Ex: 1 Cor 15:29
- 6. Recognize the progressiveness of revelation. Over time, God has added to His revelation. The New Testament for example, adds much that was not revealed in the Old. Eph 3:1-5
- 7. Guard against prejudice, Seek the author's single meaning. Be careful not to twist a text in order to harmonize it with preconceived ideas.

Process of Interpretation:

Carefully review the results of your Observations, and Detailed Study.

Ask questions: "What does it mean...." Using the principles above, answer your questions.

Restate the main points of the passage in your own words.

Compare your conclusions with the commentaries. DO THIS LAST.

5. Application

"This Book of the Law shall not depart from your mouth, but you shall meditate in it day and night, that you may observe to do according to all that is written in it. For then you will make your way prosperous, and then you will have good success.

Going Deeper with Inductive Questions

Observations: The collection of data & details. "What does the passage <u>Say</u>?"

Questions to aid your Observations:

- 1. Are there any key words, repetition of words?
- 2. Advice, admonitions, warnings, promises present?
- 3. Reasons or results for doing things?
- 4. Contrasts, comparisons or illustrations?
- 5. Repetition and progressions of words and ideas?
- 6. Questions present in the text?
- 7. Important connectives ie. prepositions or conjunctions?
- 8. Atmosphere of passage? Literary form: ie. discourse, narrative, poetry, prophecy?
- 9. Context and general structure?

Interpretation: Putting the details together. "What does the passage <u>mean?"</u>

Questions to aid in your interpretation of the passage:

- 1. What is the meaning of key words and phrases? Why did the author use them?
- 2. What is being implied by the use of this term, illustration, phrase, etc.?
- 3. Is there any progression in the thought pattern? How does this thought, verse, paragraph, or chapter fit or relate to the overall context, book, or Bible?
- 4. Does this thought or concept appear in any other places in Scripture?
- 5. What is the significance, if any, to the verb tenses in this verse or set of verses?
- 6. Why does this verse, section, or passage occur in the Bible at all?

Questions to aid in your application of the passage:

Applications: What should I personally <u>do</u> with this knowledge?	

- 1. Any insights concerning the character and or work of God?
- 2. Any command(s) or instruction(s) to obey, example(s) to follow?

- 5. Any promise to claim or take hold of?
- 6. Any needed changes in my attitude or priorities?

The 5 R's: Daily Time with God

The *Navigators* provide a suite of discipleship tools. This one is a simple guide on how to spend time with God each day.

1. Refocus

Prepare your heart and mind through confession of sin and praise. Review the previous 24 hours. Identify any sins that need confessed. Cast on Him any anxious thoughts and thank Him for His goodness toward you.

2. Read

Read the passage a few times. There are several reading programs available that will structure your efforts so that you can read through the entire Bible in a year.

3. Reflect

Reflect and think about what you are reading. Ask the basic questions of who, what, when, where, why and how. What is the flow of the passage? Why is this passage in the Bible?

4. Record

Write something down! Record your observations from this passage. Be sensitive to the teaching of the Holy Spirit in guiding you to what God is saying in this passage. Record one *take away* from this passage that you can apply during the day.

5. Respond

Respond to God's Word in a tangible, practical way. Be a doer of the Word. What truth do you need to apply, even today? Commit your obedience to the Lord and pray for the remainder of your day.

The Ambassador Toolbox

This booklet is part of a series of materials which together, give us a toolbox of resources we can use to make disciples. Every discipleship opportunity is different. There is no one cookie-cutter approach. However, the following resources are designed to give you a place to start.

- *3 Circles: Life Conversation Guide,* a pamphlet outlining a diagram of circles to initiate a spiritual conversation that sets the context for the gospel.
- The Invitation, a 5 week booklet intended for an unchurched person, with minimal exposure to the God of the Bible. Starting with Genesis, how does the Bible answer the fundamental questions of life. "Have you ever read for yourself what the Bible says?"
- Who is Jesus? This 5 week booklet is intended for the religious person with some knowledge of the Bible, maybe grew up with some exposure to Jesus, but has never really come to understand who He is.
- **New Life in Christ** This 5 week booklet is for the new believer. I just trusted in Christ, what happens now?
- The Good News of Jesus Christ, After you have had a conversation explaining the gospel, this is a follow up booklet. "How about you read through this, and we get back together again next week and talk about it?"
- Making Disciples, Series 1, Essentials for the New Believer, an 8 week study that covers the essentials for living a Christ centered life. Don't let the name fool you, it covers good reminders for any believer, no matter how long you have been saved.
- Making Disciples, Series 2, Foundations of the Faith, an 8 week study that covers the doctrines of God, man, sin, and salvation. A solid understanding of these foundational topics provide stability and confidence to the believer.
- Making Disciples, Series 3, Pressing on to Maturity, an 9 week study that covers the supernatural provisions of God for the believer to walk in a manner that honors Christ.
- Making Disciples, Series 4, Serving the Lord, an 8 week study addressing our fundamental calling to serve the Lord, our mission, our ministry enabled through spiritual gifts, our motivation, and the Lord's promised reward.





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
