Introduction

This booklet is the **second tool** in a four-part series that every believer can use to help other believers to become disciple makers. Discipleship is a lifelong pursuit. The key to this series is that it is **transferable** and **repeatable**. It is not overwhelming. It is intended to support your life long journey of helping other people find and follow Jesus Christ.

The Plan: Work through each section on your own, looking up the Bible passages and making observations. Then meet with your group to discuss your observations. As you meet, do not try to read all the verses, that will kill your momentum. Be sure to complete the "disciple making assignment" each week.

spiritual growth.

For Others: You can take what you have learned and use this series to help build

up others in understanding the foundations of our faith.

The Plan for Each Week

We encourage you to walk through this series with two or three other people. When discipleship meetings are one on one, it usually creates a "Bible Answer Man" relationship. The one being discipled (Timothy) tends to look to the one who is leading (Paul) for all the answers. However, when you meet in a small group of three to five people, the focus can be turned to the Lord and Scripture. "We are meeting together to seek the Lord and learn from His Word."

The Role of Paul

A "Paul" initiates the discipleship process. The first phase is to form the group.

- 1. Pray for who should be part of the group. (all night) Luke 6:12-13
- 2. <u>Invite</u> each person to be part of the process. Matt 4:18-22
- 3. Clarify the <u>expectations</u> for each Timothy. For example: We will meet each ______ You are expected to have completed the section before we meet Each week, you will have a Disciple Making (DM) Assignment We will hold each other accountable for the DM Assignment We will consistently pray for one another, etc. etc.

When you meet, "Paul" facilitates the flow of your time together.

<u>Model</u> what Disciple Making (DM) looks like. The "Timothy's" in the group should be able to imitate you.

Commitment & Accountability

This is not just another Bible study group.

This is focused training to follow Jesus and become a Fisher of Men.

Any Transfer of Knowledge must be followed by Obedience. Every skill in life is gained by knowledge and practice. Consider how we learn to ride a bike, drive a car, to cook, become a plumber, or doctor, or engineer.

There is classroom training and then there is some venue for doing – for practicing the skills under the watchful eye of the teacher. So it is with becoming a disciple maker, a fisher of men.

"Paul" is responsible for instilling some aspect of accountability into the group to ensure there exists opportunities for living out disciple making skills.

Recommended Format of Each Meeting

Each time you gather together, we recommend you look three directions.



Look Back

Encouragement, Celebration, Accountability, (about 20 minutes) Look back on what God has done, and is doing. Lovingly hold everyone accountable to report on their progress. Make course corrections, offer suggestions. Follow up on the "I WILL" statement and the Disciple Making assignment from the prior meeting.

Be sure to remember, this is spiritual work. Our role is to be faithful to speak the word. The results are in God's hands!

Look Up

New Insight from the Word of God, (about 60 minutes)

Look up and seek a better understanding of the Lord, and His will for our lives. Be careful to be filled with the Holy Spirit. Our ability to understand spiritual truth depends on the teaching ministry of the Spirit in our lives. The source document is the Bible. What is God saying to us through His Word?



Look Forward

Response and Application, (about 20 minutes)

Look forward and address the next steps that need to be taken to incorporate God's truths, and instructions into your life. Write down a tangible step to be taken in response to God's word. It is often helpful to identify the next step in the form of an I WILL ______ statement. It should be specific and measurable.



What does it mean to believe in Christ?

- 1) <u>Intellectual Agreement</u>: I understand and confess I am a sinner and that God is righteous. I understand that Jesus bore the penalty of my sin. He rose from the dead as historical proof He is who He claimed to be. Because of His completed work on the cross on my behalf, He is offering to me the gift of eternal life.
- 2) <u>Personal Application</u>: This applies to me. I need to change my mind by confessing my sin and my need for a Savior who is Jesus Christ alone. The Bible calls this change of mind "*repentance*." I must choose to respond, to accept or reject the invitation of Christ.
- 3) <u>A Decision</u>: I consciously decide to entrust my eternal destiny to Christ and what He did for me on the cross. This decision is typically made by a prayer to God expressing faith in Christ and a need for God's salvation. The Bible refers to this decision as "calling on the name of the Lord."

For the Scripture says, "Whoever believes in Him will not be disappointed." For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek, for the same Lord is Lord of all, abounding in riches for all who call upon Him; for "Whoever will call upon the Name of the Lord will be saved."

Romans 10:11-13

To believe in Jesus, means to entrust ourselves to Him alone for our salvation.

Faith alone, in Christ alone.

The Spiritual Growth Process

Spiritual growth requires an intentional process that takes place over time. The typical believer will move through different phases of spiritual growth, similar to the physical growth we experience from infancy to adulthood.

Characteristics of Each Phase


Infants are totally dependent. They need constant care and nourishment.

Children are often selfish. They tend to focus on their own needs: "I want." They need training and life experiences in order to become mature.

Young Adults are learning to focus on others. They need encouragement, guidance, balance, and discernment.

Spiritual Parents are spiritually mature, equipped with the Word. They have a servant's heart and understand God's plan for making disciples. They need to initiate the discipleship process with those within their sphere of influence.

Making Disciples of Others



Through spiritual growth, as we become more like Jesus, we become better equipped to make disciples of others.

Building a House

One of the word pictures Jesus used for our lives is that of a person building a house. At the beginning of His public ministry, Jesus presented in Matthew 5-7 what is called the Sermon on the Mount. Basically Jesus taught the principles of Kingdom Living. He started with the Beatitudes, character qualities that God values for every kingdom citizen.

Jesus concluded the Sermon on the Mount addressing their response to His teaching. He compared their responses to two men building a house. Read through the passage and make observations.

Matthew 7:24-29

vs 24 What conditions make for a wise man?

vs 25 What happened to the wise man's house? Why?

vs 26 What conditions make for a foolish man?

vs 27 What happened to the foolish man's house? Why?

Both men heard the words taught by Jesus.

What is the only difference between the wise man and the foolish man?

With this simple story of two men building a house, one on solid rock, and the other on sand, Jesus presents a profound warning and a promise. The trials of life will come; they are inevitable. The question is: What foundation and building materials are we using to build our lives? The following passage extends the building analogy. Record your observations:

Sound Doctrine

The focus of this series of studies is the *Foundations of the Faith*, the fundamental doctrines that support our understanding of spiritual truth. These are not doctrines meant only for seminary students to study and theologians to debate. They are truths that provide a solid foundation for every believer. Paul in his letter to the Ephesians was writing to "normal people" not seminary students. He talked about the role of believers with communication gifts.

The Trinity

Understanding the Sovereignty of God

Memorize Ps 135:6

Last week, we studied the nature and attributes of God. Our focus this week is how God relates to Himself and to His creation. At the very core of God is His relational nature. There is only one God, but He exists in three persons.

The Trinity

Without question, this is one of the most debated and misunderstood aspects of God. The Bible states categorically there is only one God. However in the unity of God, there eternally exists three persons, God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. Each person is fully God. God is absolutely and eternally one essence in three distinct personal existences, without division, and without replication of essence.

The Unity of One God

Hear, O Israel! The Lord is our God, the Lord is one!





Applying the Trinity to Life

The Trinity is not an obscure doctrine relegated to seminary debates. From the Trinity flows the <u>relational nature</u> of God which He built into creation. There are principles of life that have their basis in the Trinity.

The Image of God

Man was created in the image of God, giving man the ability to have a relationship with God and with others.

Gen 1:26-27 Gen 2:18

The Love of God

It is God's desire for the believer to experience the love that exists within the Godhead.

John 17:24-26

The Expression of Authority & Submission

Within the Trinity, there is voluntary submission. While each Person is equal, Jesus submitted Himself to the authority of the Father.

John 6:38; 14:28; 17:1-4

Submission within the Godhead, illustrates the proper relationship between a husband and a wife; equal in standing, yet distinct in roles.

The Sovereignty of God

The Sovereignty of God speaks to how God relates to all of creation, which He has made. Sovereignty means supremacy of authority to rule, royal rank, total independence. One who is sovereign has the total freedom and authority to act in accordance with his desire.

Psalm 135:6 summarizes the sovereignty of God:

Whatever the Lord pleases, He does, in heaven and in earth.

If God is not sovereign ----- then ----- everything is random.

The Exercise of God's Sovereignty

As we seek to comprehend the sovereignty of God, we must be careful to maintain <u>balance</u>. God in His sovereignty is free to do as He pleases. It is easy to conclude that God "controls" everything, but that is not what Scripture teaches. Distinct from God's sovereign right is how God has chosen to **exercise** His sovereignty. God has chosen not to control everything, but rather, He created both angels and mankind with a free will. God has granted both realms the opportunity to exercise their wills, and then holds them accountable for their decisions.

The Three Wills

Under God's sovereignty, there exists in the universe three wills:

The will of **Angels**, including the will of Satan and his demons. Satan and his demons have rejected the authority of God, and are now operating in rebellion against God. (We will look at this more in Series 4.)

The will of **Man**. God has created man with a free will, capable of fulfilling the task of stewardship over the earth. Gen 1-3; Ps 8:5-8 After the Fall, there are now two states of the will of man:

- 1) The natural, unsaved man is a slave to his sinful nature, selfish desires
- 2) The believer in Christ is a new creation, capable of choosing to walk in newness of life, in a manner pleasing to God. (more in Series 3)

The will of **God**. God reveals His will to man through the Scriptures, and the leading of the Holy Spirit. All of history is moving to the ultimate will of God:

... at the name of Jesus, every knee will bow, of those who are in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and that every tongue will confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. Phil 2:9-11

Until that day, God under His sovereignty, is allowing the free will decisions of angels and mankind to play out. The sovereignty of God <u>does not mean</u> that God "controls" everything. Yet in the midst of billions of free will decisions, the ultimate will of God will come to pass, just as He has planned.

Section 3: The Nature of Man

What is man? How do I define my Identity? Where did we come from? Why are we here?

Memorize Gen 1:26

One could argue these are the most fundamental questions in life. There is profound confusion in our culture regarding our identity. Who am I really? How do I define myself? The answers to these questions will be shaped by the underlying worldview that a person has endorsed. The centerpiece of any worldview is our understanding of **origins**.

Competing Worldviews

The common worldview taught and endorsed in our culture is *Evolution*. The theory of evolution claims to explain origins through random, natural processes. There is no god. Matter and energy are eternal. Random processes acting over billions and billions of years have resulted in everything we experience today. The fundamental claim is that if you give something enough time, anything can happen. (AKA Darwinism, Naturalism, Materialism)

The result of **Evolutionary Thinking** is vast, all encompassing. For example:

- 1) There is no absolute truth. There is no objective standard of what is right or wrong. Therefore any claim of absolute truth is unfounded and must be rejected. Morality's only basis is social norms and expectations.
- 2) There is no God who will hold people accountable for right and wrong. "Survival of the Fittest" provides justification to do what I think is best for me and my tribe.
- 3) Human life, though more highly evolved, has the same intrinsic value as all other forms of life.
- 4) There is no basis of human dignity and value. A human embryo is nothing more than a mass of tissue and can be discarded if not wanted.
- 6) As a product of random processes, I am free to define my own identity, and my own sexual behavior.

Our Worldview Matters. It has Consequences!

The Biblical Worldview

Scripture presents a very different worldview. It begins with origins.

In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth. Genesis 1:1

God is eternal. God created matter and energy. God pre-existed the universe, and is totally <u>distinct</u> and <u>separate</u> from all He created. Record your observations:

Man is patterned after God. This is what sets man apart from all other creatures. This is the basis of man's *Dignity* and *Value*.

Why is it that search and rescue teams risk their lives in an attempt to save people? This high value of human life comes directly out of Genesis 1.

Man is an image bearer of God. Human life is set apart. Because of this, what do the following passages say?

The core of our Identity is: *Image Bearer of God*God has established our identity. We are not free to redefine it.

We all draw meaning and happiness in life from our **relationships** and our **activities**.

As we studied in section 2, God is relational. As image bearers of God, we are also created to be relational. We are created to have a relationship with God and with each other.

The origin of man is not random. God created us for a reason and for a purpose. All of us long for purpose. God wired us that way.

Can you recall an example where you were tasked to do "busy work," work that from your perspective had no meaningful purpose? How did that make you feel?

Our need for purpose can be traced back to Genesis 1. God created us with a job to do. How is that job described?

God created man with **dominion responsibility** over His Creation. This requires mankind to have intelligence, creative ability and freedom of decision, all of which give mankind the ability to fulfill his assigned task.

The Inner Person


Within the immaterial self, every person possesses *Mind, Will & Emotion*.

Sin Section 4

Section 4: Sin

Sin - It all goes back to the Fall What are the consequences of the Fall?

Memorize Rom 5:12

Everywhere we look, we see the evidence of *Brokenness*. We all have an inner sense that things are not the way they should be. Broken relationships, hatred, racism, slavery, persecution, wars, the list goes on.

The Bible reveals it was not always this way. At the end of the sixth day of creation, we see God's assessment of all He had created.

God saw all that He had made, and behold it was very good. And there was evening and there was morning, the sixth day. Gen 1:31

Everything was very good, it was a "perfect environment." There was no death, decay, or suffering. All of the universe was in perfect order and balance.

Before the Fall

Before the Fall, Adam and Eve enjoyed perfect *unbroken fellowship* with God. God had entrusted stewardship responsibility over His creation to Adam and Eve giving them the capabilities needed to carry out the task.

Why do we long for a better day? How is it that we sense things are broken?

It is because we were created to live in a perfect environment, with unbroken fellowship with God. Man's relationship with God was shattered by the Fall.

Sin Section 4

The Fall of Man

Man was created to fulfill God's creation mandate and to enjoy a relationship with God. A genuine love relationship requires the freedom to choose. God did not create a robot. God created man to bear His image, including the ability to make decisions.

There was one part of God's creation that was "off limits" to Adam. What was the restriction, and what were the consequences?

Gen 2:17

This verse introduces a fascinating principle regarding knowledge. Not all knowledge is beneficial. Decisions made contrary to the principles of God's design lead to terrible consequences. God created both the angelic realm and mankind with the ability to choose, but also holds His creatures accountable for those choices. The Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil was the ultimate test of whether man chose to depend on God and live by His principles or chose to live outside of God's design. Sadly, Adam chose the latter.

The Fall explains the origin of suffering, decay, and death.

These all resulted from a broken relationship with God, our Creator.

Therefore, just as through one man sin entered the world, and death through sin, and so death spread to all men, because all sinned. Rom 5:12

However, these tragic events actually set up the revelation of God's marvelous **grace**. God still loves us unconditionally, even when we do not deserve His love. The rest of the Bible describes the unfolding of His gracious love, and a relationship God offers mankind that is secure in Christ.

The Extent of Sin

Sin is any thought, word or action that is contrary to the standards of God's perfect character. It is disobedience to God. Scripture uses several terms to describe sin: missing the mark, rebellion, iniquity, going astray, wickedness, ungodliness, lawlessness, trespasses, transgressions.

God hates what sin does to His perfect creation. Record what the following say about sin:

Theologians commonly refer to three aspects of sin.

Imputed Sin Rom 5:12-21 A financial term: to attribute to someone. The sin of Adam is credited to all mankind. Condemnation and death reign over all because of the sin of Adam. We all sinned "in him."

Inherited Sin Ps 51:5, Eph 2:1-3 Every child of Adam is born with Adam's sinful nature, a nature always prone to sin. The sin nature is passed down to each generation through the man.

Personal Sin Rom 3:9-18 Includes every aspect of our life which fails to conform to God's perfect standards.

Mental attitude sin Matt 5:27-28
Sins of the tongue Prov 6:16-19
Overt sins Gal 5:19-21

The Bible clearly states the devastating effects of sin upon mankind. Left to ourselves, we are in a hopeless state. We cannot solve our sin problem.

But God loves us and sent Jesus to save us from our sin! Matt 1:21

The Barrier Between God and Man

As a consequence of the Fall, there is a barrier between God and man. The barrier makes it impossible for man to save himself. The barrier can be described as a wall made of six blocks.

Christianity is not a religion, (a system of dos and don'ts to gain God's approval). Christianity is a restored relationship with God made possible by Jesus Christ. 

Old Testament Background, The Tabernacle


As the nation of Israel traveled to the land God had promised, God manifested His presence with them through the Tabernacle. The various parts of the Tabernacle provide a picture of both the Person of Jesus Christ and His work on the Cross as the substitute for our sins.

The articles of the Tabernacle, and their construction are described in Ex 25-28 and Ex 34-40.

Atonement

One of the most sacred worship events was the annual sacrifice made on the Day of Atonement. To atone means "to cover." On the Day of Atonement, the blood of the goat poured over the Mercy Seat acted to cover the sins of the people until the perfect sacrifice of Christ was offered on the cross.

THE TABERNACLE OF MOSES (EXODUS 35-40)

In the Tabernacle, and later the Temple, there was a daily reminder of the need for a sacrifice to be offered as a substitute for the consequences of their sins.

Redemption, the Removal of Sin

The first block in the barrier is **Sin**. We are all born into the slave market of sin.

The solution provided by God is **Redemption**. Redemption is the work of Christ on the cross in purchasing our freedom from the slave market of Sin.

The Kinsman-Redeemer

The Law contained a provision for a "kinsman-redeemer." (Lev 25:25-28, 47-49) A relative could set one free from slavery. There were four requirements:

- 1. He must have the <u>right</u>, be a near kinsman. Lev 25:48-49; Ruth 3:12 According to Heb 2:14-15, Christ became a man.
- 2. He must be <u>able</u>. He must have the power or the means to redeem. Lev 25:52; Ruth 4:4-6 Christ is able because of His resurrection and ascension. Heb 4:14; 9:11-12; Acts 20:28
- 3. He must be willing, Lev 25:25; Ruth 4:8-10 Jesus Christ died voluntarily.
- 4. He must be a <u>free</u> man. Ruth 4:1-2 Christ was without sin. Heb 4:14; 1 Peter 2:22-24; Because of the virgin birth, Jesus Christ was the only man born outside of the slave market of sin. Thus, He alone is qualified to purchase the freedom of others.

The story of Ruth and Boaz (Ruth 2-4) is a perfect illustration of the kinsman-redeemer. The most powerful example of redemption was the Exodus, Israel's deliverance from slavery in Egypt. (Ex 12, Deut 9:26) In this case, the emphasis is on deliverance, liberation from bondage. The payment price, in the background, was the Passover lamb they had to sacrifice.

Jesus paid the ransom, the redemption price, which was His death on the Cross.

Redemption Applied - Life Change

The Believer has been redeemed from the marketplace and slavery of sin by the payment of a price, the blood of Christ, and has been transferred to a state of freedom to serve God.

Jesus Christ has given us the ultimate example of serving others.

Substitutionary Death, the Removal of the Penalty

The second block in the barrier is the **Penalty of Sin**.

We are separated from God. Rom 6:23

The solution provided by God is the **Spiritual Death of Jesus Christ**.

Expiation - to make amends for a wrong which one has done, the removing of guilt by suffering punishment. Christ was judged for our sins. He took on the penalty and punishment of our sins. (Substitutionary death)

For three hours on the cross, Jesus literally bore the penalty of <u>spiritual</u> death. He was separated from God the Father and God the Holy Spirit. To help us understand what was happening, Jesus quoted Ps 22. Read through **Ps 22**.

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Having completed bearing our penalty, Jesus declared, "It is Finished!"

Imputation

The forth block in the barrier is the **Righteousness of Man**.

Man's righteousness is only relative to other men. It does not match the perfect, absolute Righteousness of God. Rom 3:10-12; Is 64:6

Suppose the height of these buildings represented their amount of righteousness. Relative to other buildings, some are very righteous. But from the perspective of heaven, they all fall short.



The solution provided by God is **Imputation and Justification**.

Imputation – is a financial term, meaning to credit to an account.

Imputation is the act of God whereby He accounts to the new believer the Righteousness of Christ.

A Financial Ledger

The Death of Christ takes away our debt, no longer a *negative* balance. The Imputation of God credits to our account perfect righteousness, an infinite *positive* balance.

This forms the basis of what God the Father does next...

Justification

(Life Change)

Based on the righteousness of Christ imputed to the new believer, God the Father makes a legal declaration and declares the sinner released from the penalty of sin, and restored as Righteous.

Justification – is the judicial act of God the Father to declare that one is righteous based on faith in Christ. Justification does not cause one to be righteous. It is the legal declaration of God made the moment a sinner trusts in the finished work of Christ on the cross.

The fifth block in the barrier is our **Position in Adam**. In Adam all die and are without eternal life. 1 Cor 15:22

The solution provided by God is the believer's Position in Christ.

Positional Truth – the moment a person places their trust in Christ, they are placed "in Christ," in union with Christ.

The Baptism of the Holy Spirit is a unique ministry of the Holy Spirit that began on the Day of Pentecost. Through the Baptism of the Holy Spirit, <u>God was forming a new entity</u>, the Church, (Matt 16:18) the Body of Christ through which God would carry out His Kingdom Work. Since the time of Abraham, God has been in a covenant relationship with Israel. When Israel rejected their Messiah, the Lord Jesus, they entered into a season of discipline, what Paul calls a "partial hardening." Rom 11:1, 17-18, 25-29 However there is coming a time when the "times of the Gentiles" will end, Jesus will return, and God will fulfill His Kingdom promises to Israel. Until that time, God is working through the Church, the Body of Christ.

Propitiation

The final block in the barrier is the **Perfect Character of God**.

God cannot compromise His Righteousness and Justice. 1 John 1:5

The solution provided by God is **Propitiation**.

Propitiation – the perfect character of God, His absolute righteousness, and perfect Justice are completely satisfied by the work of Christ on the cross. Through the complete provision of salvation, God is free to have a relationship with the believer without compromising His character.

In this is love, not that we loved God, but that He loved us and sent His Son to be the propitiation for our sins.

1 John 4:10

Old Testament Background

The background of propitiation is the Mercy Seat that was on top of the Ark of the Covenant. The blood was poured on the Mercy Seat. This was the place of propitiation, where the character of God was satisfied by the blood sacrifice.

Ex 25:17-22

The Person and Work of Jesus Christ are the perfect sacrifice for our sin and the only means by which the standards of God's perfect character are met.

Righteousness and justice are the foundation of Your throne; Lovingkindness and truth go before You. Ps 89:14

All of this provides insight as to why Jesus is the Only Way! John 14:6

Putting it All Together

Romans 1-5 is the most comprehensive explanation of salvation in all of Scripture. Our study of God's work to remove the barrier uniquely equips us to understand and appreciate the discourse of Paul to the Romans.

Romans 3:22-28

- ²¹But now apart from the Law the righteousness of God has been manifested, being witnessed by the Law and the Prophets,
- even the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ (imputation) for all those who believe; for there is no distinction;
- for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God,
- being <u>justified</u> as a gift by His grace through the <u>redemption</u> which is in Christ Jesus;
- whom God displayed publicly as a <u>propitiation</u> in His blood <u>through faith</u>.

 This was to demonstrate His righteousness,

 because in the forbearance of God He passed over

the sins previously committed;

- for the demonstration, I say, of His righteousness at the present time, so that He would be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus.
- Where then is boasting? It is excluded.

 By what kind of law? Of works? No, but by a law of faith.
- For we maintain that a man is justified by faith apart from works of the Law.

Reconciliation, the Barrier is Removed!



This booklet is part of a series of materials which together give us a toolbox of resources we can use to make disciples. Every discipleship opportunity is different. There is no one cookie-cutter approach. However, the following resources are designed to give you a place to start.

- The Good News of Jesus Christ, After you have had a conversation explaining the gospel, this is a follow up booklet. "How about you read through this, and we get back together again next week and talk about it?"
- **New Life in Christ** This 5 week booklet is for the new believer. I just trusted in Christ, what happens now?
- Making Disciples, Series 1, Essentials for the New Believer, an 8 week study that covers the essentials for living a Christ centered life. Don't let the name fool you, it covers good reminders for any believer, no matter how long you have been saved.
- Making Disciples, Series 2, Foundations of the Faith, an 8 week study that covers the doctrines of God, man, sin, and salvation. A solid understanding of these foundational topics provide stability and confidence to the believer.
- Making Disciples, Series 3, Pressing on to Maturity, an 9 week study that covers the supernatural provisions of God for the believer to walk in a manner that honors Christ.
